SANDHILL CRANE COLTS SEASON – COMING SOON!

Two subspecies of Sandhill Crane occur in Florida. The Florida Sandhill Crane population numbers between four and five thousand, are non-migratory year-round breeding residents, and are state protected. They are joined every winter by 25,000 migratory Greater Sandhill Cranes that nest every spring in the Great Lakes region. The babies are called “colts” because of their long spindly legs. These majestic birds make their home in our fresh water preservation areas. **Please be mindful of these downy Native Floridians as you travel along the picturesque roads of Palmer Ranch!**

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How Do We Compare?

We think most of our neighbors are happy living in our community—and we certainly hope you are among them. But how do the more than 65 million Americans who live in homeowner associations and condominium communities feel about their own homeowner associations and condominium communities? Are they happy with their elected boards? How do they feel about the rules?

The Foundation for Community Association Research, an affiliate of Community Associations Institute (CAI), sponsored a recent national public opinion survey to answer these and other questions. Here are some of the key findings:

- 90% of residents rate their overall community association experience as positive (64%) or neutral (26%).
- 90% of residents say association board members “absolutely” or “for the most part” serve the best interests of their communities.
- 83% say they get along well with their immediate neighbors.
- 92% say they are on friendly terms with their association board members.
- 83% of residents say their community managers provide value and support to residents and their associations.
- 88% of residents who had direct contact with their community manager say it was a positive experience.
- 70% of residents say their association’s rules protect and enhance property value; only 4% say the rules harm property values.

We’d like to think that we would do even better than the national averages, so tell us what you think we can do to make our community an even better place to live. We encourage you to get involved, so let us know how you can help. Active and engaged residents are the way to build a true sense of community. If you’re especially pleased about our community, share that too! It’s always good to know we’re on the right track.

Presenter: Marguerite Beckford, UF/IFAS Sarasota County Commercial Horticulture Extension Education Agent.

Presenter Bio: Marguerite Beckford is the UF/IFAS Sarasota County Commercial Horticulture Extension Education Agent. Her current Extension education focus areas are Urban Forestry, and Environmental Landscape Management (ELM). Since launching Florida's first trademarked urban forestry Extension program – Treejuvenation© Florida, Marguerite has sourced funding to plant 300 community trees, has hosted urban forestry Extension community events with over 400 participants, and served on the inaugural tree committee which was successful in earning New College of Florida, the designation as Florida's 21st Tree Campus USA© location. Working as a UF/IFAS Extension Agent in Miami-Dade County, Marguerite obtained a grant to launch a countywide landscape irrigation conservation project by establishing Miami-Dade's first Urban Mobile Irrigation Lab. This project resulted in a 75% increase in HOA water conservation. She has also worked on agronomic research projects in Trinidad & Tobago, and the British Virgin Islands. Marguerite's additional professional accomplishments include participating in project partnerships with the South Florida Water Management District and the USDA's Soil and Water Conservation District; receiving the City of Medley's Mayor's Community Partners Award, and a UF/IFAS Faculty and Staff Superior Accomplishment Award.
